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

DHS — Blue Campaign: What is Human Trafficking?








The term "severe form of trafficking in persons" means:

- (A) sex trafficking in which a commercial sex act is induced by force, fraud, or coercion, <u>or</u> in which the person induced to perform such act has not attained 18 years of age; or
- (B) the **recruitment**, **harboring**, **transportation**, **provision**, or **obtaining** of a person for labor or services, through the use of **force**, **fraud**, or **coercion** for the purpose of subjection to **involuntary servitude**, **peonage**, **debt bondage**, or **slavery**.

Commercial Sexual Exploitation of Children (CSEC)



- CSEC is a form of human trafficking.
- Involves a child/youth being treated as a commercial sexual object.
- Crimes of a sexual nature committed against minors for financial or other economic reasons.
- One does not need to prove that force, fraud, or coercion was used to qualify for "trafficking"
- CSEC is an extreme form of child abuse!

CSEC in the United States



- Every 26 seconds a child runs away
- 1.6 million children run away from home each year in the U.S.
- 1:3 youth will be recruited by a exploiter (pimp) within 48 hours of leaving home
- Average age of children who are exploited is between 12 15
 years old (Grace, Starck, Potenza, Kenney, & Sheetz, 2012)




Highest Risk






What's the age of consent in your state?

Warning Signs



- Sudden change in attire, personal hygiene, relationships, material possessions
- Promiscuous and/or makes reference to sexual situations or terminology.
- Has boyfriend/girlfriend that is noticeably older
- Attempts to conceal recent scars
- Poor health, STDs, malnutrition, serious dental problems.
- Identifying tattoos, branding marks

Branding = Ownership












Warning Signs Continued



- Inability to attend school, make scheduled appointments.
- Frequently runs away from home
- Makes reference to travel to other cities
- Exhibits bruises or other signs of physical trauma, withdrawn behavior, depression, anxiety, fear
- Signs of drug addiction

Street Terminology

The Life or The Game	The commercial sexual exploitation or the sex industry
Daddy	Your own pimp (evoking images of fatherhood)
P.I	In reference to another pimp
Stable	A group of women/girls under pimp control
Bottom Bitch/Bottom Girl	The head girl
Breaking	To give all your money to your pimp
Choosing	To choose another pimp
Folks/Family	Your pimp or the person for whom you work
Gorilla Pimping	A pimp who uses force to get a child
Track/Stroll	A street location for commercial sex
Turnout	Someone who recruits you into "the life"
Wife-in-Law	A group of girls who work for the same pimp
Dates/Johns/Tricks	Buyers of commercial sex
In House	Someone who works from inside a house
Out of Pocket	To look at or talk to another pimp
Stay in Pocket	To play by the rules of "the game"
Renegade	To work for oneself or to not have a pimp
Pimps Up, Hos Down	A reference to power and status or a rule of standing in the street and not being allowed on the sidewalk
Pimp Circle	A group of pimps surrounding a girl for purposes of intimidation Those who were never in "the life"
Square	
Squaring Up	To get out of the game
Squad	Cops





- Reasons for lack of support
 - Homophobia and stigma
 - Lack of screening and intake, belief that boys are not victims.
 - Limited outreach to areas of male exploitation.

Role of Schools



What can schools do?

 What are schools currently doing to address this issue?

Role of Schools



- Recognize signs of CSEC and other forms of trafficking
- **Report** to Child Protection Services and/or to Law Enforcement
- **Educate** children and youth about the warning signs and about healthy social-emotional relationships
- Expand Mandated Child Abuse trainings for staff to include CSEC
- Follow-up on youth who runaway, are 'missing", and chronically truant
- Act Convene or participate in multi-disciplinary task forces that focus on trafficking prevention
- Connect Victims to Resources (e.g. Mental Health)

Interview Questions




- Do you want to get out of the life, but are trapped and afraid to leave?
- Have you been forced to engage in sexual acts with someone in exchange for favors/money?
- Were you tricked into selling sex thinking you would be doing something different?
- Are you under the age of 18 and is someone pressuring you to sell sex?
- Do you have a debt to someone that you can't pay off?
- Has anyone threatened to hurt you, your family, or friend if you refused to sell sex?
- Is anyone physically or sexually abusing you?
- Has anyone taken sexual photos of you to post online?
- Does anyone take all or part of the money that you earn?
- Is someone holding your passport or identification cards for you?

Cultural Humility



- Victim-Centered
- Aware of own biases Be careful not to blame or judge
- Combine general knowledge about various cultures with specific information provided by trafficking survivor
- Recognize that diversity exists both within cultures and between cultures
- Access for persons disabilities is also part of cultural humility





As a mandated reporter, if you suspect a **child** is being trafficked...



you **must** report it to Child Protective Services or Law Enforcment!!!





Buying a Child for Sex is Child Abuse...


